News from the Desk of Superintendent, Dr. Denny Wulf.....

Superintendent's Update

What a first semester! Much is occurring locally, statewide and nationally in education. Nationally, the congress is debating the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This legislation has a large impact on education. At this point, there will be many changes in the mandates present in No Child Left Behind (NCLB). It sounds as if Title 1 reading assistance for students will be retained. The Common Core will move from national control to state control. But, more will become apparent as the legislation receives final approval.

At the state level two primary changes are coming. The first is Smarter Balanced testing which will replace Iowa Testing in many situations. More information about Smarter Balanced testing can be found at <u>http://www.smarterbalanced.org/</u> Smarter Balanced will have more opportunities for students to demonstrate problem solving skills than our present testing. As a test run, Norwalk was chosen to take an international test by the Department of Education. Norwalk represented those schools that continually rank highly in the previous forms of testing. We represented the top 10% of Iowa's most "proficient schools". However, we were not in the top 10% internationally. To create workers for the future, our kids will need more problem solving skills. There is an old bromide that "what gets measured, gets done". Moving away from minimum competency testing to the challenge of international-style testing will definitely raise the bar. Our inclusion in the pilot study this year helps us plan.

A second change at the state level is the Iowa Report Card. As I write, the information is embargoed. Next week the information will become available to all Iowans. But, if you are interested in becoming familiar with the previous model, several years of data can be found at https://www.educateiowa.gov/document-type/state-report-card Phase 1 of the new report card was rolled out last year. You may recall the large scatter plot that displayed minimum competency and college and work readiness measures for every district and school in Iowa. Phase 2 will now include growth data this year, which Norwalk lobbied for. It will also include staff retention data and other measures. Phase 3 roll out in the future. It will contain extensive surveys of constituents and staff about teaching and learning. These types of surveys have been used in Norwalk for over a decade. This requirement fits well into our present data collection process.

Locally, it has been one of the finest first semester performances by Norwalk students in our history. Achievement scores still rank us in the top percentages in Iowa and nationally. The results from the new State Report Card should be solid. Activities provided us with the finest overall fall programing in my memory. And my memory is long. Conference champions, state competition, and unbeaten streaks dominated the central Iowa news. Congratulations to Director Lammers and his staff.

There is also the excitement of growth. The district will need to expand facilities to accommodate this growth. There is no doubt, we are filling up. New spaces, remodeled spaces, and expanded spaces will be necessary. Professional planners and architects are closely examining our growth projections and facilities to present options. Expect our traditional opportunity for public input on these options. In the past, your input resulted in renovations, an auditorium, class size recommendations, new parking, a new stadium, an all-weather track, updated classroom designs, a secondary campus where sharing is common and dozens more. You have much to be proud of.....and much to look forward to.

As many of you are aware, this will be my final year in Norwalk. I will be forever grateful for the opportunity to work for you. You provided me with a great career. The process of choosing the next superintendent is well underway. You will find that the Norwalk superintendency has evolved into a coveted job. There will be outstanding candidates. I wish the selection committees luck on what I am sure will be a choice between great people. A good problem to have!

Norwalk's Research-Based Approach to School Improvement

It is the belief of Norwalk Community School District that *our fundamental purpose is to create a rigorous, collaborative and inclusive learning environment for all students so each individual is empowered to pursue a lifetime of personal success in college, career and citizenship.* Further, we believe that we can be highly effective in promoting student learning if we utilize a research-based framework to guide our school improvement efforts. One such research-based approach is the Marzano High Reliability Schools (2014) framework. Norwalk Schools has been engaged in the study of Dr. Marzano's work for many years, and we continue to use research to monitor our own effectiveness as a learning organization. The High Reliability Schools 14) framework, based on forty years of educational research, defines five progressive levels of performance that a school must master to become a high reliability school—where all students learn the content and skills they need for success in college, careers, and beyond. High reliability schools encompass the following five levels of operation for school improvement efforts:

- 1. Safe and Collaborative Culture
- 2. Effective Teaching in Every Classroom
- 3. Guaranteed and Viable Curriculum
- 4. Standards-Referenced Reporting
- 5. Competency-Based Education

Our collective study of this framework is not a new initiative for Norwalk. For many years, Norwalk has been utilizing research to guide to our school improvement work. We have developed a safe and collaborative culture by utilizing the Professional Learning Community (PLC) process with teacher teams and by developing a Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) system for our students. We have implemented the state of Iowa's Teacher Leadership and Compensation System to ensure that all teachers have the job-embedded professional development needed to provide the highest quality classroom instruction to every student. We have engaged teachers in a multi-year curriculum review process to implement the Iowa Core curriculum in every classroom as well as develop a Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) to ensure that every student learns at high levels. In the coming year, we will begin to study the implications of the Iowa Core on our reporting systems, in addition to collaborating with the Department of Education to develop our understanding of their Competency-Based Education initiative.

Because of Norwalk's commitment to using research, such as Marzano's High Reliability Framework, to drive our school improvement efforts, we are among the highest performing schools districts in the state of Iowa as measured by the Department of Education's Attendance Center Rankings. However, as Jim Collins' writes, "good is the enemy of great". Norwalk will continue to strive for excellence in the years to come and to achieve our mission of empowering students *to pursue a lifetime of personal success in college, career and citizenship.*

News from our Transportation Department John Stoner, Director



Iowa's statue for School Bus Stop Arm Violations has changed dramatically. Effective July 1, 2012, Kadyn's Law became effective. The law increases previous fines, offers possible suspension of license, and even jail time.

Bus drivers activate their yellow flashing lights a minimum of 150 feet from a bus stop to notify the public they are preparing to stop. Cars approaching a bus from in front and behind must be preparing to stop. Upon reaching their stop the driver opens the door and the yellow lights cancel and the red lights start flashing and a flashing stop sign opens. It is against the law to pass a school bus with a stop sign open and red lights flashing.

Each time your school bus driver uses his or her bus they do a pre-use inspection of their vehicle. They check many things including their various lights. If a deficiency is found during their inspection the bus is not used until it is repaired.

Winter is here. Please help the Transportation Department identify clothing and personal items left on buses by including your students name inside using a permanent marker.

Our "Hard Surface Only Plan" includes bus numbers, times, and stop locations on days where we decide that for students safety we will keep buses on main roads only. If we start the day on "Hard Surface Only" we will complete the afternoon on that same plan.

Information for Parents

If your family lives in any of the following situations:

- In a shelter, motel, vehicle, or campground
- On the street
- In an abandoned building, trailer, or other inadequate accommodations, or
- Doubled up with friends or relatives because you cannot find or afford housing

Then, your preschool-aged and school-aged children have certain rights or protections under the McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Assistance Act.

Your children have the right to:

- Go to school, no matter where you live or how long you have lived there. They must be given access to the same public education, including preschool education, provided to other children.
- Continue in the school they attended before you became homeless or the school they last attended, if that is your choice and is feasible. If a school sends your child to a school other than the one you request, the school must provide you with a written explanation and offer you the right to appeal the decision.
- Receive transportation to the school they attended before your family became homeless or the school they last attended, if you or a guardian request such transportation.
- Attend a school and participate in school programs with children who are not homeless. Children cannot be separated from the regular school program because they are homeless.
- Enroll in school without giving a permanent address. Schools cannot require proof of residency that might prevent or delay school enrollment.
- Enroll and attend classes while the school arranges for the transfer of school and immunization records or any other documents required for enrollment.
- Enroll and attend classes in the school of your choice even while the school and you seek to resolve a dispute over enrolling your children.
- Receive the same special programs and services, if needed, as provided to all other children served in these programs.
- Receive transportation to school and to school programs.

When you move, you should do the following:

- Contact the school district's local liaison for homeless education (see phone number below) for help in enrolling your child in a new school or arranging for your child to continue in his or her former school. (Or, someone at a shelter, social services office, or the school can direct you to the person you need to contact.)
- Contact the school and provide any information you think will assist the teachers in helping your child adjust to new circumstances.
- Ask the local liaison for homeless education, the shelter provider, or a social worker for assistance with clothing and supplies, if needed.

Norwalk Schools Pest Management Spraying Notification

The Norwalk Schools implements an integrated pest management program for all school owned green space. This program includes aerating, dethatching, mowing, trimming, mulching and spraying for pests. Spraying for pests includes fertilization, pre-emergent crabgrass control, post & pre-emergent weed control, and weed control along all fence lines and buildings. Any resident that has property that is adjacent to school property and wishes to be notified 24 hours in advance of any pest control should contact Sue Sarnecki <u>ssarnecki@norwalk.k12.ia.us</u> or Richard Sleeth <u>rsleeth@norwalk.k12.ia.us</u>. All individuals or groups that might use school grounds for any function should watch for "keep off chemically treated" signs. These signs are placed on treated green space for 24 hours after treatment. If you see these signs you should stay off that particular green space until the signs are removed. We take this task seriously and have a commitment to keep our environment safe. The district has two licensed pest treatment employees. Pest treatment is always our last line of defense and we use it sparingly in our integrated pest management program.

Norwalk Activities Office

The fall athletic & activity is now well behind us and a number of our programs had a success fall season. The highlight of the fall season was the state runner-up finish by the football team and the first ever Little Hawkeye Conference championship achieved the Norwalk Volleyball program. The Norwalk High School Marching Band had one of its most successful campaigns as they were awarded with a Division One Rating at the State Marching Band contest and finished in the upper division of several other contests, competing at the 4A level. And the debate team for the first time ever won the CIDL. Congratulations to Kennedy Scallon on her state cross country meet participation. And now that we are in the midst of our winter season we hope that the same level of success will be achieved by our boys and girls basketball teams, bowling team, wrestling team, drill team, the jazz band, show choir, large group speech, individual speech, and the rest of our activity programs.

As we focus in on our winter schedule, now would be an appropriate time to bring attention to and discuss what the expectations are of students of all ages who attend our many activities, especially basketball games and wrestling meets.

First and foremost we encourage any and all student's K-12 to come and support our high school teams but in so doing the expectations are that they are there to watch the game and support the teams. Using the events to run freely through the hallways, or to mingle and socialize outside of the event area for the majority of the contest does not meet the expectations that we have of our students who attend Norwalk High School events. A designated area for the 6-7 student body is located in the northwest corner of the balcony seating; our 8th & 9th grade student body is expected to sit in their designated area which is in the balcony area behind the designated high school student body in lower bleacher level.

One other area of concern is the number of students younger than our middle school students who come to games with or without parents but who seemingly use the high school facility as their own personal playground. Any student who attends a game or an event and is younger than middle school age should be accompanied by an adult and should be seated with their parents while the event is in progress. And if not accompanied by an adult should be informed of what type of behavior is expected of them while at that event. Any student whose behavior is deemed unacceptable and does not meet expectations will be asked to seat themselves with their parents or call their parents to come and get them and depending on the severity of the behavior may be banned from attending future contests.

We would like to simply ask for parental cooperation and support in explaining what is appropriate behavior and expectations when their child attends events at Norwalk High School. We truly appreciate your cooperation.

Appropriate behavior and sportsmanship is not only an expectation of our students and athletes but it is also a greater expectation of our fans who attend games and meets. All fans are ambassadors of our teams, school, and community and the type of behavior that we display creates either a positive or negative image of who we are. The Iowa High School Athletic Association and the Iowa Girls Athletic Union have made sportsmanship a #1 priority of all schools throughout the state of Iowa and we ask that Norwalk Fans be a representative and positive image for other schools and communities to emulate.

AIMSweb Assessment

AIMSweb is an assessment system which Norwalk utilizes to assess students three times a year: September, January & April.

The reading and math benchmarks are simple and accurate. In the early grades (k-1), we will measure early literacy and numeracy skills, including letter-naming fluency and number identification. In the later grades (2-8), we measure the high-leverage skills of reading fluency and comprehension as well as math concepts, applications, and computation. Benchmarks are brief, taking anywhere from 1 minute to 8 minutes each. We like to think of it as taking your child's reading and math temperature. The winter benchmark will start January 19th through February 5th.

Benchmark assessments help us meet the individualized needs of your child in reading and math as they progress through our system. Teachers will utilize benchmarks to help them plan their reading and math instruction as well as design supports for students who are above or below average in their progress toward grade level targets. Students are provided different levels of support in order to ensure all students meet the expectations of the Iowa Core standards. As a district, it helps us to measure the overall health of our curriculum to ensure that it produces high levels of learning and growth for every child in Norwalk.

Your child's AIMSweb scores are indicated on the report card, and you will be receiving a graph to show your child's current strengths and weaknesses as a learner, and next steps to help them grow in their learning.

With the state's literacy legislation, our goal is to have every student reading at grade level by the third grade. For more resources about reading, please visit the Iowa Reading Research Center's website at <u>www.iowareadingresearch.org</u> under the "Parents" tab.

Emergency School Closings (Board Policy 504.7)

On emergency dismissal days, radio stations WHO-1040, KRNT-1350, Q102 FM, and KJJY-92.5 FM will be notified, as well as television stations 5, 8, and 13. You may also visit our web site at http://www.norwalkschools.org/ for up-to-date school closing information. It is important that phone lines are kept open for communication from the district office. Each family is required to have an emergency plan on file in the classroom designating where the student should go in case of an emergency closing that occurs after the students arrive at school. This could be for weather, loss of utilities, disaster, etc.

School Called Off – All Day

The announcement called into the media will be, "**Norwalk, No School.**" Cancellation of activities scheduled for that evening will be made by the Activities Director by 1:00 p.m.

Late Start

If it is determined that school will start late, it will be a two-hour delay. The announcement called into the media will be "**Norwalk-two- hour delay**. **No morning Preschool. No breakfast**." For a late start doors will open at 9:30 with the tardy bell ringing at 10:05.

Early Dismissal

Typically, if we have to dismiss early due to an emergency school closing, we dismiss at 1:00 p.m. The media announcement will be, "**Norwalk dismissing at 1:00 p.m. No afternoon preschool**." Oviatt will dismiss bus students at 1:00 p.m. or when the busses arrive. The rest of the elementary population will wait in their classrooms and get out immediately following departure of busses. If we have to dismiss earlier than 1:00 p.m. due to severe weather, treat the time sequence the same. (Bus students dismissed when the busses arrive at the elementary and the rest of the students dismissed at the time announced.) All evening activities will be cancelled.

Iowa School Alert System

Our school district is part of the Iowa School Alert System. Check the District's homepage for more information on this program. If you are already a member of the Iowa School Alert System, search for Norwalk and sign up to receive notifications about school closings. This system emails you in the event that a weather related closing or delay takes place. You can also fill in your cell phone number and have the email sent to your cell phone for notification.

Weather & Recess Preparedness

Oviatt Elementary follows the guidelines recommended by the Child Care Weather Watch and the lowa Department of Public Health. Their website is

<u>www.idph.state.ia.us/hcci/common/pdf/weatherwatch.pdf</u>. Make sure your child is dressed adequately to spend 20-30 minutes outside. Students will be expected to go outside regardless of their dress. Boots, scarves, mittens, hats, warm coats, etc., should be worn as appropriate to the weather. If your child does not bring boots for damp or snowy conditions, he or she is required to stay on the blacktop. If your child must miss recess for more than two (2) consecutive days, a doctor's note will be required.

If you cannot provide these winter clothing items for your child(ren), please contact the principal, dean, or counselor, Sonya Chittenden, for confidential assistance. Thank you in advance for working with us to make sure your child is dressed for lowa weather.

When Children Get Sick

If a child has a fever or other illness, the school nurse or the school secretary will call parents to come and pick up their child. However, the nurse is not permitted to diagnose, so see your physician in regard to illness and injury occurring away from school. A child must remain out of school 24 hours after a fever of 100 degrees or higher has broken, or if applicable, vomiting or diarrhea has stopped. Parents are encouraged to plan ahead for such occasions.

Changes with PT Conferences

This year we have only one day of conferences in February with the other two days the first week of May. The majority of parents will set up conferences in May. We wanted to allow a day for conferences mid-year to communicate with parents. Invitations will be sent out from teachers of those parents they would like to meet with on Monday, February 15th. Since we have only one night of conferences in February, students WILL have school on Thursday, Feb. 18, but WILL NOT have school on Friday, Feb. 19th. Note these dates since it is a change in how we have done conferences before.

2016-17 Kindergarten Registration

We are going paperless for registration. You will be able to get online to register your child starting mid-February. Please check the school district's website at http://www.norwalkschools.org/. If you do not have access to a computer, please contact Diana Spieker, District Registrar, at 981-0676.

We thank you in advance for your participation in this registration process. Your promptness in completion of registration forms allows us to be proactive in staffing appropriately for the kindergarten class of 2016-17. If you want your child to participate in kindergarten orientation at the end of May, we need to have your child's registration completed by the first week of May (this gives us time to get information in the system prior to orientation).

Enrollment is limited to approximately six general education three year-olds and 28 four year-olds. You can enroll one of two ways:

- 1. Access registration forms from the Oviatt Preschool Program website; or,
- 2. Request a packet of registration materials by calling Arlene Kluesner, Principal's Secretary, at 981-1005 or email her at <u>akluesner@norwalk.k12.ia.us</u>.

All completed registration packets, along with a \$60 registration fee, must be received by Mrs. Kluesner <u>during the Week of February 29th.</u> Registration closes at 4:00 p.m. Friday, March 4th. Completed registration forms can be hand delivered or mailed to Oviatt Elementary at 713 School Avenue, Norwalk, IA 50211.

Registration materials delivered prior to 7:30 a.m. February 29th or after the closing date/time on March 4th will be included in the lottery system explained below only if there is space available in the 2016-17 preschool programs. You are encouraged to follow the times/dates as detailed. Thank you.

Selection Process. A lottery system approach will be conducted the following Monday, March 7th, with parents informed early that week if their child is included on the roster of the 2016-17 Oviatt Preschool Program. At this point, if a child's name is not drawn, the parent has the option to place the child on a Wait List. All registration fee payments for those children who are not drawn are shredded or returned, based on parental preference.

Specific Information for the Three Year-Old Preschool Program

General education three year-olds attend Monday, Tuesday, Thursday & Friday, 8:05-11:00. Tuition is \$215/month, and is due the first day of school each month. We have no transportation services.

There is a \$60 registration fee. Enrollment numbers in this program are capped to ensure a balance of three and four year-olds in our a.m. session.

Current general education three year-olds enrolled in the preschool program will automatically be enrolled in the four year-old program for the 2016-17 school year, for those families who opt to continue their participation in the Oviatt Preschool Program.

Specific Information for the Four Year-Old Preschool

Four year-olds attend Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, 8:05-11:00 for the morning session and 11:50-2:45 in the afternoon. There is NO tuition fee since we participate in Iowa's Statewide Voluntary Preschool Program. We have no transportation services for general education students. There is a \$60 registration fee.

Oviatt Preschool Program Open House

We offer a Preschool Open House on **Thursday, February 25 in the evening** for families interested in learning more about the three and four-year old 2016-17, Oviatt Preschool Program. Families can tour the classrooms, meet the teachers, and have questions answered. An RSVP at 981-1005 is appreciated, but not required. We look forward to meeting you and your child(ren)!

Community Preschools' Registration Information

Community participation in the Statewide Voluntary Preschool Program for four-year olds is very positive by providing a quality preschool program at little or no cost to parents. Registration plans for 2016-17 are now developed. If you want your child to attend preschool next year at one of the following three area preschools: 1) Serendipity Preschool, 2) Stepping Stones Preschool, or 3) Oviatt Preschool Program, continue to read below.

We are glad you have an interest in one or all of our preschool programs! To qualify for the financial benefits of the Statewide Voluntary Preschool Program, your child must be age four on or before September 15, 2016. Four year-olds have a minimum of 10 hours of tuition-free instruction.

Common Program Attributes

Our three preschools meet quality preschool standards that address the following attributes:

- 1) Research based curriculum focused on the child's development in the following critical areas of social/emotional, physical, cognitive, and language skills
- 2) Ten hours minimum research-based instruction per week
- 3) Early childhood licensed teachers
- 4) Early childhood certified teacher assistants
- 5) Maximum enrollment number of students per session is 20 children with one teacher and one teacher assistant
- 6) Preschoolers who live outside the Norwalk community can attend preschool at one of these three sites; however, there is no open enrollment option for children who attend preschool in the Norwalk community but live outside the school district's boundaries when they reach kindergarten age.

Unique Program Attributes

The Norwalk community is fortunate to have a variety of preschool options available for families. Stepping Stones Preschool is a faith-based program that provides preschool and daycare. Serendipity Preschool offers a not-for-profit preschool program. The Oviatt Preschool Program, located within Oviatt Elementary School, serves students with special needs, as well as general education students. Each preschool program has unique qualities that may assist you in determining where you prefer your child attend. You are encouraged to contact each preschool to determine which program best meets you and your child's individual needs.

The allocation of funds for the *Statewide Voluntary Preschool Program for Four-Year-Old Children* is intended to improve access to quality early childhood education and provide a predictable, equitable, and sustainable funding method to increase the number of children participating in quality programs. The preschool programs are expected to serve four-year-old children with a range of abilities and disabilities representing the social, linguistic, and economic diversity of families within the community.

Please note:

We want to remind parents that the Voluntary 4-Year-Old Preschool program is a State funded program. As such, the program may be subject to change based on decisions made by the Iowa Legislators and Governor. Changes might include a tuition charge for students to participate in the program. The District will continue to operate under the current law until we are notified of any changes.

Staff Development:

One of my tasks as a building principal is that "learning" occurs for not only our students, but our teachers. Working collaboratively in recurring cycles of collective inquiry and action research should yield better results for the students they serve. I feel strongly that "two heads are better than one" and teachers should be expected to collaborate with their peers. It is a building expectation that they share strategies and tools at least once per week within their team. The teams learn from each other, much like the students do within the classroom.

I wanted to share what the Lake-wood staff did during the building portion of the early out from the beginning of the year. The teachers have been diligent at looking at the Iowa Core standards and taking time under-standing how that would relate to their teaching. The teachers are in professional learning communities and during Early outs, they concentrate on priority standards, common assessments and data interpretation.

The teachers are able to design interventions directly related to the weakness of the student. Each teacher will be able to give a prescription of instruction, based on each student's needs. The other part of the professional development time together will be spent on analyzing rigor and how instruction can change within the classroom in order to produce better thinkers. These early outs and Tuesday early bird sessions are invaluable to the work that we do to better educate your child.

Congratulations to Shelly Vroegh for Being Norwalk Teacher of the Year

It is my pleasure to announce that Shelly Vroegh has been named the Norwalk Teacher of the Year. She has been in the district for 19 years and has taught a variety of subjects. She first came to Norwalk as a special educator, then served as a 2nd/3rd Grade looping teacher for many years. She taught 3rd grade at Lakewood and is currently teaching 5th grade. She has had numerous leadership positions in the district throughout her teaching career. She is currently serving as an Instructional Coach as part of the Teacher Leadership Compensation Program. She is a great representation of what is great about Norwalk Schools.

Student Class Placement

According to Norwalk School Board Policy 501.4, all regular students enrolled in grades kindergarten through 5th grade are placed heterogeneously and by random assignment with gender/cultural equity. In grades one through five if a parent feels that a child immediately following another sibling shouldn't have the same teacher, they may request a change. This request must be IN WRITING and made by the end of April.

Parents are not allowed to request a certain teacher for their child. If a parent has any concerns, you should contact the building principal.

Absences:

If your child will be absent or late to school, we ask that you call the office by 8:30 a.m. at 981-1850. If no contact has been made, the secretary will call and verify their attendance. If there is no answer, we will do a "well child" check at your home.

Lost and Found

Please mark your child's belongings and clothes. We have many items in the Lost and Found at school and also at the bus barn with no names. We ask that you mark everything that your child may not have with them 100% of their day (lunch boxes, book bags, books, coats, hats, boots, snow pants, folders, toys, etc.). Please feel free to come into the school and retrieve your lost items.

Winter Weather

Winter weather is upon us. We want to remind all parents of our recess policies. The Norwalk School District will follow the guidelines recommended by the Child Care Weather Watch & the Iowa Department of Public Safe-ty.www.idph.state.ia.us./ hcci/common/pdf/ weather-watch.pdf. Please make sure children are dressed adequately to spend 20-30 minutes outside. Please make sure your child has a hat, mittens or gloves and winter coat. If we have snow, students MUST have snow boots or they will need to stay on the blacktop and not be able to play in the snow. If your child needs to stay inside from recess for more than three days, you will need to send a doctor's note. Please be sure your school dressed for the cold weather. If you are not able to provide your child with winter items, please contact Mrs. Jensen anytime for confidential assistance.


Traffic in the Middle School Parking Lot:

If students earn the OCI privilege, but choose to stay at school, the high school library is available as a quiet study area from 7:45 a.m. until 3:20 p.m. each testing day. If students would like to socialize or prepare for exams in a more relaxed environment, please go to the cafeteria. Roaming the halls of any building is not an option, as this distracts test-takers and students who have class.

Buses will run on the regular schedule. Students qualifying for the Open Campus Incentive will need to arrange for their own ride or wait in the cafeteria for the bus.

Semester Test Reminders to Students:

Tests are comprehensive. Study ALL of your notes from the ENTIRE semester, check your teacher's web page for practice tests or study guides, and review your old assessments. Studying a little bit each night will help you more than cramming the night before.

Be on time for each exam. Most teachers will lock their doors when the testing time begins. If you are late and locked out, you will need to report to the Eastview office immediately. Students who miss their exam will be required to make it up during the time period designated for make-ups. If you have a study hall, report to your usual study hall location during that testing period. Use your passing time wisely: go to your locker, get a snack/drink, and use the restroom. Teachers will not allow you to leave the room during the entire testing period (even if you are finished with your test) as this disrupts other students who are testing.

Our practice is to confiscate the phone until the end of the day and issue a warning to the student. Multiple offenses have increased consequences and parent contact. Interestingly, students sending/reviewing text messages with parents account for some of the problems. Please advise your student to only send/review messages during passing time or lunch.

If there is an emergency and a parent needs to contact their child, we ask that parents call 981-9655 and we will contact the student. We will continue to deliver messages to students in the least disruptive manner.

Illness Procedures

Flu season is upon us. Prior approval is needed from the school nurse and/or contact from the building secretary before a student is permitted to leave the building. This process ensures the legitimacy of the illness as well as maintains the security of monitoring students for attendance purposes. With the increased use of cell phones, occasionally students have contacted parents directly without making a connection with the nurse or main office. Please encourage your student to follow these outlined procedures in order to ensure the safety measures established by the school district.

Passes To Leave School Early

When leaving early from school for appointments, students should obtain a pass from the office in order to be released from class. This is the student's responsibility. If your student is unaware of a scheduled appointment, please call and we will deliver the message to your student along with a pass to be dismissed from class.

Vehicle Traffic

Please be reminded that after school pick-up for 8th and 9th graders is located on the north side of the high school (near band/choir) or at the Middle School. **Only bus traffic will be allowed at the 17th Street entrance from 3:00 – 4:00 p.m.**

Student Parking




