- Students will participate in the AimsWeb Plus assessment this year in both math and reading. These assessments will occur three times a year. The purpose is to help the teachers meet the individualized needs of your child in reading and math as they progress through the year.

Norwalk Continues to Raise the Bar on the ACT

The Class of 2017 earned Norwalk's highest ACT composite score yet, according to data released this September. The average composite score for 2017's graduating class was 23.6, a full 1.7 points higher than the state average of 21.9.

Other notable data points:

- Of the 207 graduates in Norwalk's Class of 2017, 133 (64%) took the ACT at least one time.
- Students who take courses beyond the minimum requirements in math and science see significantly higher ACT composite scores overall.
- While the overall statewide percentage of students meeting the college and career ready benchmarks is on a slight decline (31%), Norwalk's percentage continues to climb (47%).
- 29 students identified out-of-state post secondary plans while the remaining students indicated a preference for an in-state college, university, training program or career path.
- Only 27 students took the optional ACT Writing portion of the exam.

The ACT is a nationally recognized college and career readiness assessment that includes items in Reading, English, Math, Science and Writing (optional). It also includes student survey information regarding course of study, future college and career plans, and preferred post-secondary institutions. Parents or students interested in additional information on national and Iowa trends should consult ACT's annual report, The Condition of College and Career Readiness 2017.

AIMSweb Testing:

Three times a year students are tested in reading and math to make sure they are on track to meet grade level expectations plus are making growth from fall to spring and year to year. These tests are a benchmark; they provide data to help us guide our instruction for what each child needs to grow and meet grade level expectations. Students are tested in the fall (September), in the winter (January), and in the spring (April). We will send home your child's report after each benchmark. The fall testing reports will be sent home the first week of October. If you have any questions about the testing or your child's results, please contact your child's teacher.

STEM:

This year we have a new special that all kindergarten, first grade, and second grade students go to for one of their specials. STEM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics which is taught by Mr. Morsch. Students experience activities that incorporate all of these components. Norwalk received a grant which provides modules through Project Lead the Way (PLTW) that are engaging hands-on activities. We are excited to have this opportunity for all students.

Kindergarten modules: engineering design process to create a tool for a specific purpose; learning about the human body and create a cast for a broken arm

First grade modules: learning about light, sun, moon & stars to create a playground to protect them while playing in the sun; create a program through coding of interactive characters on an iPad

Second grade modules: learning about properties of matter to engineer a design to keep items cold without a cooler; using coding to create their own game

ESL Program in Norwalk



The English as a Second Language (ESL) program in Norwalk serves English Learner (EL) students who are currently learning to speak, read, write and listen in English. The program is designed to reduce linguistic barriers to the district's instructional program and provide access to a specialized language instruction educational program for our EL students.

The ESL program has seen a tremendous growth in students over the past several years (see graph below). The languages currently represented in the district include: Spanish, Somali, German, Korean, Laotian, Nepali, Russian, Thai, and Vietnamese. There are EL students in every grade from K-12. Our EL students participate in many extra-curricular activities such as: football, cross country, volley-ball, and "Heart and Sole" at the middle school, to name a few.

The district currently has one full-time ESL teacher, Ms. Kanost, and one half-time ESL teacher, Ms. Overton.

As Norwalk continues to grow, it is anticipated that the ESL program will also grow. The district will continue to look at ways to best prepare for and meet the needs of our future EL students.





Steps for Ensuring Safe School Bus Loading and Unloading

- Remove straps and ties. Make sure all drawstrings, ties and straps on all clothing and backpacks are removed. This will lessen the likelihood of them getting caught in bus doors, railings or aisles. Be especially careful of drawstrings with large knots or baubles on the end.
- Arrive at the bus stop early. Stay at least 20 feet away from the street while waiting for the bus. Do not approach the bus
 until it stops completely and the driver signals you to board. Enter in single file without pushing. Always use the handrail.
- Take your assigned seat right away. Remain seated facing forward. Keep your hands, arms and head inside the bus.
- Always listen to the driver's instructions. Follow the driver's instructions at all times.
- Be courteous to the driver and other students. You may talk quietly with your neighbors, but avoid making noises that could distract the driver or bother other passengers. Stay seated with your hands to yourself.
- To exit the bus, wait until the bus comes to a complete stop before standing up. Use the handrail when exiting the bus. Be sure to take all of your belongings. Be careful that none of your clothing becomes snagged on any part of the bus as you leave the bus.
- Stay out of the Danger Zone. This is the area close to the bus in the front, sides and back where the driver may have difficulty seeing you. To make sure that the driver sees you while you are standing on the side of the street, take 10 giant steps ahead of the bus and out of the Danger Zone. You should be able to see the driver and the driver should see you. If you can see the driver's eyes, then the driver can see you. Never crawl near, around or under a bus.
- If you must cross the street after you get off the bus, wait for the driver's signal.
 - First, make sure that the driver sees you. While you are standing on the side of the street, take 10 giant steps ahead of the bus.
 - You should be able to see the driver and the driver should see you. If you can see the driver's eyes, then the driver can see you.
 - The driver will raise his/her hand. Once the driver lowers his/her hand, it is safe to start to cross.
 - When you get to the middle of the street, stop and look both ways before going any farther. Then cross in front
 of the bus.
 - If your driver honks the horn, STOP right away and return to the side of the street from which you started to
- Never run back to the bus, even if you dropped or forgot something.
- Never horseplay around a school bus, even if it is stopped.
- Don't stop or crawl near a school bus. Stay out of the Danger Zone at all times.
- Never go behind a school bus.
- If you drop something near the bus, don't stop or bend over to pick it up. If you dropped, lost or forgot something, ask the driver for help.
- Be extra careful if you have to cross the road to get on the bus. Look both ways before starting to cross the road. Wait until there are no vehicles. Then cross in front of the bus.
- If your driver honks the horn, STOP right away and return to the side of the street from which you started.
