### Growing Learners and Leaders: Norwalk CSD's New Portrait of a Learner and Mission Statement

I am thrilled to announce that the Norwalk CSD Board of Directors approved a new "Portrait of a Learner" vision for district students, staff, and parents. The board also approved a new district mission statement. Amy Gage, Director of Academic Services led this work and provided the update below on this important work:

# Academic Services Amy Gage, Director of Academic Services

The Portrait of a Learner: A Vision for Norwalk Schools

In a rapidly changing and complex world, schools need to not only prepare students with rigorous academic content, but also be intentional about fostering critical thinking, communication, collaboration, creativity and other 21st century skills our students will need to be successful. To help generate a vision for this work, many school systems across Iowa have engaged their larger community in developing a Portrait of a Learner, a collective vision that articulates the community's aspirations for all students.

On Monday, April 22nd, the school board approved Norwalk's new Portrait of a Learner. This vision was collaboratively developed by the district's Teaching and Learning SIAC, which consisted of district administrators, teachers, parents, community members and students. Norwalk's Portrait of a Learner, coupled with a new mission statement of "Growing Learners and Leaders", will drive our vision and strategic planning efforts to define the type of educational experience we seek to create for all Norwalk students.

### DARE Graduation - Morning of May 20th

Norwalk Community 5th Grades at Lakewood school are taking part in the D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) program. D.A.R.E. students have held class discussions, practiced role-playing, and asked questions regarding some difficult peer pressure situations. Soon students will write personal essays regarding their decisions about drugs and alcohol and ways to resist harmful substances. Upon completion of this program, students will be honored at a graduation ceremony, held May 20th at Lakewood.

### End of the Year Activities

As a building leader, my paramount responsibility is to speak out for kids. I want them to grow both academically and socially. Many times, I have to remind both teachers and parents that my responsibility is to each of the children in this building. The Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development position on education affirms that "a comprehensive approach to learning recognizes that successful young people are knowledgeable, emotionally and physically healthy, motivated, inspired, engaged in the arts, prepared for work and economic self-sufficiency and ready for the world beyond their own borders." I recognize the importance of assessments as diagnostic tools for improving student achievement, but also value the importance of student exhibits, demonstrations and presentations. ### STUDENT PLACEMENT IN CLASSES (Board Policy 501.4)

Placement of all regular students enrolled in grades K through 5 shall be determined by the superintendent or designee, with the goal of maintaining heterogeneous learning environments. The superintendent may make individual changes in student placement in response to recommendations from elementary principals and staffing committees.

All regular students enrolled in grade first through 5th grade shall be placed in classes heterogeneously by random assignment with gender and cultural equity. Parents are not allowed to request a certain teacher for their child, however, a parent with a child immediately following another sibling who is placed with the same teacher, may request a change. This request must be IN WRITING and submitted to the principal by the third Friday of May. The child concerned will be moved down one spot, in alphabetical sequence and placed accordingly. If the alphabetical sequence places the child under a teacher other than the exclusion requested, he or she will be placed in accordance with normal assignment procedures.

### **Medical Detectives**

## Project Lead the Way: Medical Detectives



### **Taking Vital Signs**

7th grade students were able to take a brand new course this year called Medical Detectives. During the first unit, they collected blood pressure, pulse, respiratory rate, and temperature from their peers and interpreted the data. They were then able to interpret the data and explain how it is used to diagnose.

### Diagnosing a Patient

Students were able to read patient files and interpret the signs and symptoms, analyze patient test results, and diagnose patients. They were then able to learn how medical professionals create treatment plans. They conducted an antibiotic sensitivity test - plated E.coli, applied various antibiotics, and determined the best course of medicine to treat that bacteria. In doing so, they also learned the significance of antibiotic resistant bacteria.







### Nervous System

Students were able to learn about the central and peripheral nervous system - including the structures and functions of the neuron and brain. The culminating activity was to dissect a sheep brain!

### 2019-2020 STUDENT REGISTRATION

2019-2020 Online Registration (OLR) will begin for all PK-12th grade students on May 15, 2019.

An annual registration must be completed for ALL students (returning and new). The online application for both new and existing families can be found here.

The district will again be offering discounted fees for registration and transportation fees to all parents that register **and** pay fees prior to June 30<sup>th</sup>. Early registration of students allows the district to properly plan for the number of students served and the specific needs of individual students. The "Early Bird" discounts will end if both steps (OLR & fee payments) are not completed by June 30<sup>th</sup>. The 2019-20 fee schedule can be found right or by clicking here. Fees can be paid through Revtrak Online by clicking here **after** submitting the registration application. Debit or credit card payments are accepted with no transaction fees.

- Parents of students qualifying for Free and Reduced meals and completing the fee waiver must complete the registration by 06-30-19 but the payment date is extended until 08-01-19 when the new Free & Reduced meal application is due. If the student does not qualify, fees are due immediately.
- Transportation requests, activity passes & student parking permits are now included in the online registration process.
- Transportation requests received after 08-01-19 may not be placed on a bus route until 09-09-19.
- Bus passes are scheduled to be mailed 08-15-19.
- All students are required to have a bus pass to board their assigned bus.
- All fees for the household must be paid in full before parents are eligible to purchase optional school services such as Pay-for-Ride Transportation or Student and Family Activity Passes.

## Norwalk Nurses Update

### Be immunized or be excluded from school: Vaccines Save Lives!

Per the <u>Iowa Department of Public Health</u>, each student attending school in Iowa must obtain all the State <u>required vaccinations</u> and provide records before starting school.

Norwalk CSD will enforce this law this coming school year. Therefore, if immunization records are not completed and submitted to your child's school nurse, your child will NOT be allowed to attend school until such records are provided. The only exceptions are if a parent/guardian provides:

- 1. a medical exemption form
- 2. a religious exemption form
- 3. documentation that their child has received <u>at least one dose</u> of the required vaccines but has not completed all the required immunizations. A provisional certificate may be written by the school nurse. (Note: This provisional enrollment only lasts up to 60 calendar days, after which exclusion would still occur if no records are received.)

Your child's school nurse will be sending more information to you in the coming weeks if immunizations are needed.

Remember, this must be done by the time school starts (August 23rd) otherwise your child will not be allowed to start school until the required immunization form, exemption forms, or provisional form are completed and received by the school nurse.


